More than 50 years has passed since *Gideon v. Wainwright* established the bedrock principle that people facing serious charges in criminal cases are guaranteed the right to counsel free of charge if they cannot afford an attorney. However, states and counties continue to struggle to provide effective counsel to defendants who lack financial resources to hire counsel for their defense. New York has consistently ranked among the minority of states—including Georgia and Louisiana—where state government provides the least financial support for indigent defense, and has been the target of a class action lawsuit challenging its public defense system on constitutional grounds. This panel will discuss the obstacles that exist to fulfilling the ideal of the right to counsel for eligible defendants and what steps can be taken now to fundamentally reform the system to provide justice for the poor.
